Summer Brain Drain

Summer is here, but just because school is almost out, that doesn't mean learning is! Did you know the average student loses 17-34% of the year's learning over the summer? It is helpful to think of the brain as a muscle that needs to be worked out to be strong.

Here are some easy ways to help your child with summer learning:

Reading! – Reading is a very important skill for children of all ages. Students who struggle with reading not only struggle with their schoolwork, but also with their self-esteem and comfort at school.

- For children not yet reading: Read aloud to your child as they look and point to the words. Help them learn new words by asking them to repeat or try on their own.
- For early readers: Ask your child to read aloud with you. For early readers, the more practice the better! Avoid criticizing your child if they struggle with reading — this can turn them off to reading for good. If they cannot read five words on a page, the book is too advanced for their level.
- For independent readers: Ask your child questions about what they're reading. Even better, read the same book so you can have a family book club discussion about it!

Math! – Math skills are central to everyday life. When you're buying groceries, creating a budget, or planning a Metro ride, numbers show up in our lives all the time.

- For pre-K-early elementary: Number recognition and counting can be done almost anywhere! Asking your child, "How many are there?" can help them practice this basic but necessary skill.
- For online fun: www.IXL.com has practice math problems to use. You can play for free up to 10 questions a day, or ask your child's teacher for a log-in.



June Curriculum

For the month of June, Playtime's curriculum will focus on overcoming challenges. Children will learn to celebrate the challenges we all face and the courage it takes to overcome them with the book *Jabari Jumps* by Gaia Cornwall. Sensory play activities will help children explore the topic of water and ocean conservation. In June, we will also celebrate African American Music Appreciation Month with a drum circle demonstration from the Malcolm X Park drummers and the sounds of Playtime's longtime friend, Uncle Devin.
